Large Slate of Candidates Vie for Village of Elm Grove, Elmbrook School **Board, Wisconsin Superintendent of Public Instruction Seats**

As consequential as it is to select a U.S. president, senator, or congressperson or send a qualified individual to a state's legislature, I have long argued that it is also critical that we pay attention to who we elect on the local level. When governmental positions are uncontested on a ballot, unless there is a tremendous write-in campaign for someone, the lone candidate need do very little to get elected or re-elected. That is not a good thing.

Luckily, for a variety of motivating

factors, a bevy of candidates has stepped forward to ask for our votes. Two residents are running for Village President; 6 candidates hope to get one of the 3 Village Trustee seats up for election; 3 candidates seek 2 different seats on the Elmbrook School Board; and 2 individuals want to be our next Wisconsin Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Elm Grove TRUSTEE Candidates

(3 seats up for Election)

"Local politics" is highly important. Those elected will have the power to make decisions which will affect this community and surrounding communities for many years to come.

Vote in-person on or before Election Day at Village Hall or request an Absentee

Covid Vaccines Offered to Eligible E.G. Residents

If you are a resident of Elm Grove, either age 65 years and older or a healthcare worker, you may register to receive the Covid-19 vaccine during upcoming inoculation events at Village Hall.

Dr. Jon Robinson, Director of the Village's EMS is being assisted by a group of qualified EMS medical personnel, and local volunteers are helping with registration and administrative duties.

By the end of February, Elm Grove Emergency Services had vaccinated Village EMS, fire, police and public works employees with their first and second doses. Additionally, 195 residents have received their first vaccination, and 84 of them have been given both doses.

Candidates for Elm Grove Village President

Neil Palmer (I) and Mary Inden

#1. Tell us about yourself.

*Mary Inden: Village Trustee 10 years; Owner The Gilded Edge, Frames & Gallery 23 years; Owner Home Staging Consultants 2000 – now; Village volunteer & Chairperson, July 4th festivities, 34 years; Multi-Tasker.

*Neil Palmer: My wife, Jill Varick, and I have lived in Elm Grove for 34 years and our three children attended Elmbrook schools. I have served as Village President since 2005.

#2. What has motivated you to run for election at this time?

*Neil Palmer: I am seeking one more term in order to help guide Village efforts to complete the flood control project by daylighting Underwood Creek in the Village center, and to participate in the proposal to redevelop the School Sisters campus.

*Mary Inden: It's time for new thoughts and planning for this unique Community. I've been frustrated with a number of Board decisions that have been made recently.

#3. What can you offer our Village that is unique from the other candidates AND what do you most hope to accomplish if elected?

*Mary Inden: With 30 years in retail, I know local businesses are vital to this Village. Volunteers are our most valuable assets, and I know that we need more women on our committees. Because respecting each other is important, we need thorough, respectful communication between the Board and the citizens.

*Neil Palmer: I have deep knowledge and understanding of how the Village operates and what both the old and new challenges we face are. Village residents with conflicting interests and opinions about the best future for Elm Grove. I see the President's role as helping residents understand the pros and cons of the options available for the challenges

#4. What are the greatest challenges that you see facing Elm Grove now AND how would you help deal with them on the Board of Trustees?

*Neil Palmer: The greatest challenge before us is to define the future of the School Sisters of Notre Dame campus. The sisters are moving out in the summer of 2021 and have granted Mandel Development an option to redevelop the site. Mandel has proposed a combination of single-family homes and high-end apartments. Redevelopment of the campus is a unique challenge due to the desire to find a way to pay to restore and preserve the two historic structure, the cost to demolish the other buildings. Doing nothing is not an option. This site is currently zoned institutional, and I do not think any of us want to see a new institutional use redevelop the site. I believe the Board must work to get the best and highest quality new development possible. On the long term I believe the most important issue for the Village is to secure access to Lake Michigan water. Municipal water is necessary for commercial improvements, fire fighting improvements and to safeguard residential values.

*Mary Inden: I will take a deep comprehensive look at the plans for opening the Creek and Downtown Master Plan... overly expansive and expensive. Pathways are great! We need to finance more. The Convent redevelopment will happen. We need to keep negotiating for size and style needed to enhance the neighborhood/Village. Municipal water from Milwaukee needs to be negotiated. We are an independent Village, and should work with our neighbors and the State to stay that way.

#5. Do you think that our Village's downtown area is healthy and successful? If not, what action(s) would you suggest to change that?

*Mary Inden: Our "Downtown" businesses and buildings are privately owned successes. We need to understand that changes/enhancements come from within, with encouragement from the public/government. Having owned retail, I understand the need for walk-by and drive-by traffic to support our merchants. Village enhancements will help! We should all "Shop Local" including government.

*Neil Palmer: I do not think our downtown is very healthy, despite the best efforts of some of our existing businesses. Most residents say they support efforts create a more vibrant walkable downtown. The Village Board must continue to support downtown

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

#1. Tell us about yourself.

- *Katy Cornell: I was raised in Elm Grove and my husband Tim and I are now raising our five children here.
- *John Den Boer: I was born and raised in Waukesha, WI. My family and I are very grateful to have recently moved to Elm Grove.
- *Tom Michalski: I'm a retired I.T. professional, 21-year Elm Grove resident. I am active serving the Village; 15 years as a Firefighter, 10 years as a Trustee.
- *Kristina Sayas: My parents taught me to make a difference you must be involved. I'm a small business owner, a graduate from DePaul and Northwestern and married to a grove native.
- *Jennifer Stuckert: Elm Grove resident 30+ years. Past President of the EG Woman's Club who is committed to keeping EG the special place we all call home.
- *Ted Wentzel: I am a husband, father of 3 and marketing professional. I serve in the Elmbrook Rotary, on the Elm Grove Community Foundation board, and as Oktoberfest Chair.

#2. What has motivated you to run for election / re-election at this time?

- *Katy Cornell: I am a true representation of women and mothers in Elm Grove. I want to preserve our quality of life and do what is best for our community.
- *John Den Boer: This election comes at a time when Elm Grove is at a point of pivotal transition. Continued great leadership is needed to guide the Village.
- *Tom Michalski: I want to use my professional skill of listening to people to create practical solutions and move Elm Grove through this crucial period of renewal.
- *Kristina Sayas: That families experience joys similar to those my husband cherishes from growing up here, seeing examples of community engagement, helping neighbors and preserving our traditions.
- *Jennifer Stuckert: Concern over the density and the impact proposed developments will have on our community. Recently retired, I'd like to give back to the community.
- *Ted Wentzel: Civic duty is part of my DNA from serving in the military, coaching my kids' teams, to community volunteerism and I am excited to continue on that path.

#3. What can you offer our Village that is unique from the other candidates AND what do you most hope to accomplish if elected?

- *Katy Cornell: My experience as a trustee, in combination with my family history here, affords me the opportunity to understand the complexities of the issues placed before the Board. Regardless of the topic at hand, my desire is to be part of the solution and carry on the legacy of this great village.
- *John Den Boer: As a former Clinical Neuropsychologist, I gained significant knowledge in how to best facilitate group decision making. As a CEO, I pride myself in operationalizing and implementing decisions that are in the best interest of both financial and community. As an EG Trustee, I hope to help the entire community engage in the most evidence-based, community-level dialogue and decision making possible.
- *Tom Michalski: As a Village Trustee, a County Supervisor, and WCTC Board member, I have a broad perspective and understanding of the opportunities and challenges facing Elm Grove. Change is inevitable. My goal is to work with residents to manage the change in a way that preserves our values for future generations.
- *Kristina Sayas: I'm the Chicago girl that fell in love with Elm Grove. I'm fortunate to hold leadership positions with multiple village organizations which provides me a unique prospective of our current challenges and opportunities. I would represent the residents of Elm Grove by listening, responding and acting in their best interests.
- *Jennifer Stuckert: I promise to represent the residents of Elm Grove and not the developers. Development decisions have long term implications in terms of traffic, school boundaries and emergency services. Change is important to keep a community vibrant, but change MUST maintain the character of Elm Grove.
- *Ted Wentzel: I have lived on the east coast, west coast and throughout the Midwest and never been part of a community as unique as Elm Grove. I want to ensure balanced governance that promotes a dynamic and evolving community and at the same time preserves the character of the village.

#4. What are the greatest challenges that you see facing Elm Grove now AND how would you help deal with them on the Board of Trustees?

- *Katy Cornell: The redevelopment of the SSND property is an example of the challenges we will face into the future as we desire to move our village forward yet keep it committed to its heritage. As a Trustee I have learned to listen to all sides and work to find the middle. I have learned to ask questions and seek counsel, to remain open minded. Decisions require time, listening and understanding of all sides.
- *John Den Boer: On the surface, the single greatest overall challenge appears to be expanding the infrastructure of the Village while maintaining its integrity. This is a difficult yet accessible challenge if we increase cohesive community dialogue and aim for practical and solutions with empirical backing. I would assist in gathering empirically-based solutions and promoting teamwork at all levels.
- *Tom Michalski: Elm Grove is facing two primary challenges, the inevitability of change, and the belief among many of our residents that the elected officials are negotiating behind closed doors. You have my commitment to open governance with clear communication and easy access to me personally. The Village's long-term viability needs to be secured by quality development. At the same time, I will work to ensure all future development reflects Elm Grove's character.
- *Kristina Sayas: I feel one of the greatest challenges facing Elm Grove is the struggle between keeping Elm Grove a quaint village, but at the same time, finding ways for responsible economic development. Though this is a challenge, it can be done by identifying developers, businesses, and community partners that will respect the historical character of our community, and incorporate their business models into it. This would allow Elm Grove to retain its predominantly residential character.
- *Jennifer Stuckert: Development of downtown area so that it meets the needs of our residents first, followed by the merchants who have invested in our community. It is important to strike a balance that is a win for all. Listening, responding to concerns, understanding the why behind the question or concern. Asking questions to increase understanding; responding based on community feedback. Other challenges include roads, expansion of village pathways, daylighting of Underwood Creek and water.
- *Ted Wentzel: Promoting development at all costs without proper consideration for how it will affect the village's community culture. We are surrounded by a city that is growing haphazardly and continuously adding high density rental units. We cannot lose our unique sense of identity by trying to mimic those actions. I am in favor of development but feel it should be responsible and in sync with what already exists.





#5. Do you think that our Village's downtown area is healthy and successful? If not, what action(s) would you suggest to change that?

- *Katy Cornell: Our downtown is home to many wonderful goods and services that Elm Grove is fortunate to call its own. However, there is certainly an opportunity for enhancement. I believe municipal water and an increase in people living in the immediate area would be beneficial to the business community.
- *John Den Boer: Yes, but I do think that certain aspects of the downtown's infrastructure will limit its long-term vitality. These include, but are not limited to, solidifying and diversifying the financial base, responding in a dynamic fashion to the changing needs of the EG population, and supporting our aging business that have been the backbone of making the downtown an amazing community.
- *Tom Michalski: Historically, the Village Center was healthy and successful but has endured a long period of decline, and is currently barely viable. The Master Plan identified residents' desire for a walkable and accessible downtown with added green space. I will work with residents and business owners to achieve these goals.
- *Kristina Sayas: My concern is the downtown vacancies. I would work with the business association to create solutions to increase the patronage of our local enterprises and encourage them to further invest in our community. We've had great success with current village events that can be further leveraged to meet these goals.
- *Jennifer Stuckert: Elm Grove is charming but is in need of a facelift. I would activate and reinvigorate the Community Development Authority to purchase land/properties and then incentivize the type of local development residents would like to see. I favor incremental changes, local investment and facade grants.
- *Ted Wentzel: I feel the downtown is filled with successful small businesses that are frequented by my family and neighbors. We should encourage property owners and the village to continue to enhance existing structures and walkways to promote consumer traffic with an eye towards a walkable downtown village center, as discussed in the master plan.



Past Times

The SSND Farm at Elm Grove

Mother Caroline Friess, superior of the School Sisters of Notre Dame (SSND) in America, bought property in Elm Grove, Wisconsin to establish an orphanage, but she also intended to use the property as a farm that could supply food for the Milwaukee Motherhouse. The venture started small, but by the 1920s, the farm was producing large quantities of vegetables, fruit, dairy products, honey and meat, which were used to feed the residents of both Elm Grove and the Milwaukee Motherhouse.

Initially, the farm raised mostly vegetables, because the Sisters did not have money to pay workers or the necessary buildings and tools needed to raise grains. The Sisters also had a small number of livestock and poultry, which were kept on a neighboring farm. In 1863, Mother Caroline bought a working farm that consisted of 90 acres, a frame house, barns and sheds. She purchased more land in 1864 and 1865, increasing the size of the property from the original 40 acres to approximately 200 acres.

The chronicles for Elm Grove provide a nice record of the life on the Sisters' farm by recording events, such as what was planted and the yield; the birth, purchase and slaughter of animals; the erection of buildings and new ventures, such as beekeeping.

The chronicles also detail the small events that make up farm life, such as the blessing of a new cow barn and pig sty or when the Sisters received an automobile used to deliver milk to the Motherhouse. A particularly harrowing event occurred in 1892 when Sr. Gamelberta Walesch was teaching the orphan girls how to kill and clean a chicken. Sister assisted by holding the chicken's head and was accidently struck with the cleaver. "The poor sister ran at once into the sick room, the pain was so severe that she nearly fainted." It took four weeks for her thumb to heal.

The Sisters and hired men also had to contend with problems, such as bad weather, plant eating critters and even thieves. In 1887, the men planted the first cornfield, but they ended up having to replant it, because "these horrid creatures [mice and gophers] devoured the corn plantlets with greedy haste." That summer was dry and food in the meadow was scarce, so the "poor cattle found only scanty grass and was obliged to break in, wherever possible, into oat fields and well as cornfields." Some of the cattle even broke into a neighbor's field, causing \$8 in damages.

Thieves were another problem. In 1892, the Sisters discovered that their "largest, most beautiful and best cow" had been stolen. The hired men went in search and found the cow on its way to the slaughterhouse in Cudahy. In 1910, thieves stole a "pail full of milk" and three years later some daring thieves raided the chicken coop, stealing 100 hens, nine geese and two ducks.

By 1927, the farm was producing a large quantity of items, including approximately 3,200 bushels of grains, vegetables and fruit, 644 quarts of berries, 5,325 pounds of beans and 4,300 heads of cabbage a vear. In addition, the farm produced 24,532 dozen eggs, 169,241 pounds of milk, 5,125 pounds of honey as well as butchered livestock and poultry.

In 1955, the congregation began selling the farm land to raise money needed to build a health care facility to care for aging sisters. In 1959, the cows were sold and in 1970, the iconic red barn was demolished. Today the only remnant of the once fruitful farm is the grape arbor, which has been producing grapes since 1886.

Elmbrook Rotary's Puzzle Palooza Raises \$10,000+ for The FOOD Pantry Serving Waukesha County


The Elmbrook Rotary Club held an online silent auction, February 12-19, to raise funds for The FOOD Pantry Serving Waukesha County. The FOOD Pantry has seen an increased need for food distribution during the global pandemic.

Called Puzzle Palooza, the auction idea came from the spouse of an Elmbrook Rotary member. She noted that many people have enjoyed working puzzles during the pandemic and that the fundraiser was an opportunity to pass along these gently-used puzzles since most people only work a puzzle once.

The online auction had over 200 items, including some new puzzles and puzzle company gift cards. \$10,000+ was raised through bidding on gently-used puzzles and cash contributions (both matched dollar for dollar with a grant from the Elmbrook Rotary Foundation).

Karen Tredwell, Executive Director of The FOOD Pantry, reports that pantry usage was 30% higher in April, May, & June of 2020 compared to 2019, and increased usage has remained comparable this year. The FOOD Pantry is currently serving about 6,000 individuals per month throughout the entire Waukesha County area.

For safety protocol purposes, food distribution now occurs outside, even in subzero weather. Virtual curbside delivery is also possible by pre-ordering.





Ms. Tredwell also explained that cash donations go further because of reduced prices at outlets such as "Feeding America." Cereal, milk, fresh fruits & vegetables, formula, baby food, canned fruits & vegetables, and proteins are especially useful and needed.

Tredwell had this comment about the Elmbrook Rotary's generosity: "Each and every year we rely on a compassionate community to assist us in getting the resources to serve our people. We were excited to have this very unique and fun fund-raiser called Puzzle Palooza, and we find it very heart-warming."

After the outbreak of COVID-19 in 2020, Elmbrook Rotary also contributed \$7,694 to The FOOD Pantry for emergency relief. Thus, in the past 10 months Elmbrook Rotary has provided more than \$17,700 in assistance. Pantry staff have indicated that the funds from this most recent fundraiser will be used to operate a new mobile food pantry at Elmbrook School District's Burleigh Elementary School.







Estate Planning: Choosing Your Representatives

By Attorney Isabell Mueller

Choosing someone to be your financial power of attorney, personal representative, or the successor trustee for your trust is one of the most difficult aspects of estate planning. Often you end up choosing the same person for each role.

Other times there might not be a good choice and a trust company is most appropriate. These are highly personal decisions and there is no right or wrong way to go about it. There are, however, some qualities that you should keep in

Integrity: These should be people in whom you have complete trust and confidence as they will have access to your finances, and control over your assets after your death.

Experience: While they do not have to be experts themselves, some solid financial experience is necessary. Your agents will be making significant financial decisions for you or your beneficiaries. Also, they have to have the experience to know when and how to hire the right professionals, such as accountants, attorneys or realtors.

Impartiality: If possible, someone who will be viewed by family or beneficiaries as impartial and fair. This will help if disagreements arise and the person you name has to step in to settle the matter. Depending on family dynamics, your best choice may be a trusted friend, or an outside person or entity, to act in this role to maintain impartiality.

Patience: The agents you name will have to act during some of the most stressful times in your family's life. Because they are in a position of authority, your agent may become the most obvious target when emotions run high. Consider naming someone who understands this and can remain calm.

After choosing someone for each role, you should also try to designate a successor to serve in the place of your first choice if your first choice is unavailable for one reason or another.

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

Stop Gerrymandering

Do you favor updating our state unemployment system, so unemployment checks come in a timely fashion? Do you favor a mask mandate? Do you favor an increase in the minimum wage? Do you favor legalization of marijuana? Do you favor background checks for all sales of guns? These things are among many favored by the majority of Wisconsin voters. Yet, no action has been taken by the state legislature.

Although Governor Evers called 7 special sessions to address such issues, legislators gaveled in and out of the sessions, often within minutes. No legislation has resulted. In fact, the legislature didn't even show up to work for months, and has been cited as the laziest of full-time state legislatures, meeting 18 times less often on average.

Gerrymandering is one of the chief reasons for this problem. Most state races are not competitive because Republicans spent \$4 million of our tax paper dollars in 2011 to pay lawyers and courts to gerrymander district boundaries, creating lots of loops and bends to assure no competition for their seats in the legislature. The result: Republicans get 2/3 of the seats, despite getting only 45% of the vote.

What can be done? First, google the Peoples' Maps Commission and send a message stating that gerrymandering has allowed the state legislature to ignore issues important to you. Next, in upcoming elections, stop voting for legislators who ignore or even vote against your concerns.
